Why is RE important to us?

The important thing about RE is that it promotes peace and understanding;

It educates us about the world we live in,

It prepares us for life beyond school,

It teaches us to question and probe,

It teaches us to challenge and advocate,

But the most important thing about RE is that it promotes peace and understanding

Religious Education is not about teaching children what to believe. It is about developing well informed, respectful young people with positive world views. We want our children to ask questions and wonder about religion as well as to explore and celebrate their own and other people's beliefs.

At Sytchampton Endowed Primary School, we believe pupils should be taught RE in order to help them to:

- acquire and develop knowledge and understanding of Christianity and the other principal religions represented in Great Britain
- develop positive attitudes towards other people, valuing and respecting differences
- to live harmoniously within a diverse society, developing moral courage and challenging intolerance

What do we teach in RE?

In RE we aim to give children a grounded understanding of Christianity and the major world faiths. As the children progress through the school they will encounter different religions and world views in more detail. In **Key Stage One**, children will learn about **Christianity**, **Islam**, **Judaism and**

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Hinduism. In **Key Stage Two,** children will revisit these religions as part of a spiral curriculum, and will delve deeper into more theological questions and issues.

How do we teach RE?

Children aim to answer a 'big question' linked to the faith(s) that they are studying. This will involve learning about the beliefs and practices of religions and reflecting on their personal response to the big question.

Religious Education at Sytchampton may be taught through Art, Drama, Storytelling and investigating artefacts. We try to ensure that children have the opportunity to visit places of worship for as many of the faiths taught as possible.

At Sytchampton, we believe it is important for children to consider their own ideas and world views when looking at different faiths whilst also gaining an understanding of how other people's beliefs may shape their lives. Through this, we enable our children to become confident, reflective, spiritual and morally aware people who can play a highly positive role in shaping modern Britain.
